

General Summary.—During the earlier half of the month rough wet weather prevailed over the whole of the United Kingdom, with occasional thunder and lightning in most places. Later on some improvement was reported in the south and east; elsewhere, however, the conditions remained very unsettled, with frequent, and, in some cases, heavy falls of rain. Aurora was seen in the north and west of Scotland between the 1st and 4th. Pressure was very low, especially in the north; temperature was above the average; the winds were rather variable in Ireland and Scotland, but chiefly Westerly or Southwesterly over England; rainfall was greatly in excess of the normal; bright sunshine was deficient at all but a few of the English stations.

MINSKIP.

On Wednesday, about 2-30 o'clock, while Mr. Scott, huckster, Minskip, was returning from the Knaresborough market, he was struck by a tile which was blown from a house in High Street. The tile struck Scott on the head, scattering his brains. Death was almost instantaneous. Dr. Mackay was immediately summoned and pronounced him to be dead. The body was taken to

























"in order that no misunderstanding may go abroad as to the design of the promoters of this Institution, the Committee consider it proper to state, that their object is to rescue these children from that state of mental darkness in which they are usually found, and by general instruction to place them as nearly as possible, upon a level with their fellow-creatures in the same sphere of life - to teach them their duties towards God and man, which without the assistance afforded them at an establishment of this kind, they have not the remote chance of learning, destitute of which, they would, in all probability, remain a burden upon their friends or the state, and their lives would be passed under the unrestrained dominion of their natural evil passions."




